CKO: Chief Knucklehead Officer

Recently it was decided that henceforth following the Ph.D., my title would include the abbreviation CKO, which stands for Chief Knucklehead Officer. It is not as bad as it sounds.

So, how can you to be the CKO of your career? It begins with the knowledge that you own your career. This ownership frees up a great deal of energy that would otherwise be employed to show well to others and not be viewed as making mistakes. It is an action focused mindset.

Crucial to being a CKO is making mistakes. Because their ego is not on the line, a CKO pushes boundaries, tries new things and makes adjustments, even as they fail. They know that many of their decisions will be wrong and require correction as further information becomes available. A CKO does not deny or explain away their mistakes because action always needs to be taken. They know that how things work is more important than how they appear.

Like Captain Aubrey, a CKO bases their decisions on their higher-level goals to achieve success for not only themselves, but for their associates and organization as a whole. They view this leadership ability as "not a matter of pride," but rather "a matter of duty."

My wish for you is to be a CKO: Chief Knucklehead Officer. You have nothing to lose but your hesitancy. You will gain productivity, greater knowledge of your potential and the ability to own your career at increasingly sophisticated levels.
